#### PREFACE.

Since the appearance of the "Catalogue of the Egyptian Antiquities" in my Collection in 1897, I have been fortunate enough to be able to add very considerably to my Collection, and as I deem a very large number of my acquisitions to be of importance, I feel it to be my duty to publish some account of them. This I do in the present work, and I hope that the descriptions which I have written may be useful to students of Egyptology. With the view of making the newly acquired objects available to those who are unable to see the Collection personally, I have added drawings of all important objects. These have been made from the original objects by my friend Mr. E. Towry Whyte, F.S.A., whose carefulness and skill are well known. I take this opportunity of tendering him my grateful thanks for the time and labour which he has expended on the work. My thanks are likewise due to the Society of Antiquaries for allowing me to reproduce some plates published in *Archaeologia*.

The hand is well formed, grasping the palette, which is like a scarab; upon the base, which is uppermost, are six holes  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch in diameter and  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch in depth, roughly drilled; these have been lined with cement and contain traces of paint-blue, black, white, yellow, and two red; one of these last was probably brown, one of the primary colours. Upon the centre of the forearm is a hole, into which the cup for water was no doubt fixed, as the Egyptians always mixed their paints with water. The palette has probably been coloured all over, and was held by the artist in his left hand by the wrist of the object, so that the face of the hawk should face him. Plate XXVIII.
