






b. Excavating the Temple of Amenhotep 2nd and the houses surrounding it. The letters M and N show the new Empire levels.




a. The series of New Empire buildings overlying the southern and eastern parts of the Governor's House.




PLATE 48. ORTHOSTATS FOUND NEAR THE TEMPLE OF AMUN.




TYPES OF POTTERY FROM H, A NEW EMPIRE CEMETERY.

























CONJECTURAL PLAN OF THE TEMPLE AS ORIGINALLY DESIGNED BY HATSHEPSUT.



CONNECTIONAL PLAN OF THE TOWER AS ORIGINALLY DESIGNED BY HANSTEPPERT.


