## PREFACE

---

OF the hundred plates contained in this volume, ninety-five represent papyri of which the texts are printed or described in the third volume of *Greek Papyri in the British Museum: Catalogue, with Texts*. The papyri reproduced on the last five plates belong to a large group of documents from Aphrodito (the modern Kom Ishgau), which, though acquired at the same time as many of the papyri now published, form a distinct group and are reserved for separate publication.

The plates are arranged chronologically, and a numerical table is prefixed. It has been necessary to make some alterations in the arrangement since the 'Table of Papyri' in the text-volume was printed off, and consequently some of the numbers given there between 81 and 94 are incorrect. The table in the present volume shows the true references.

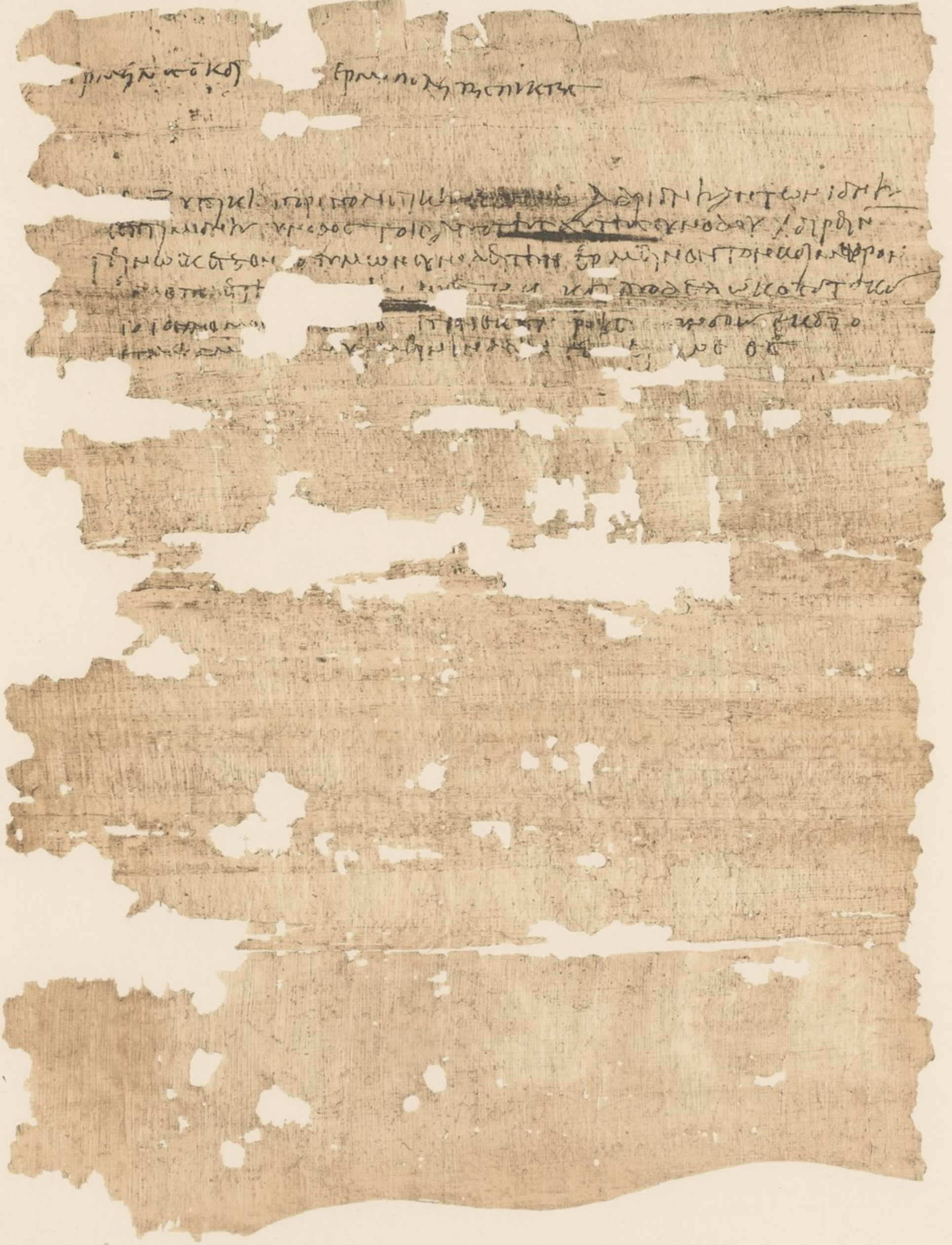

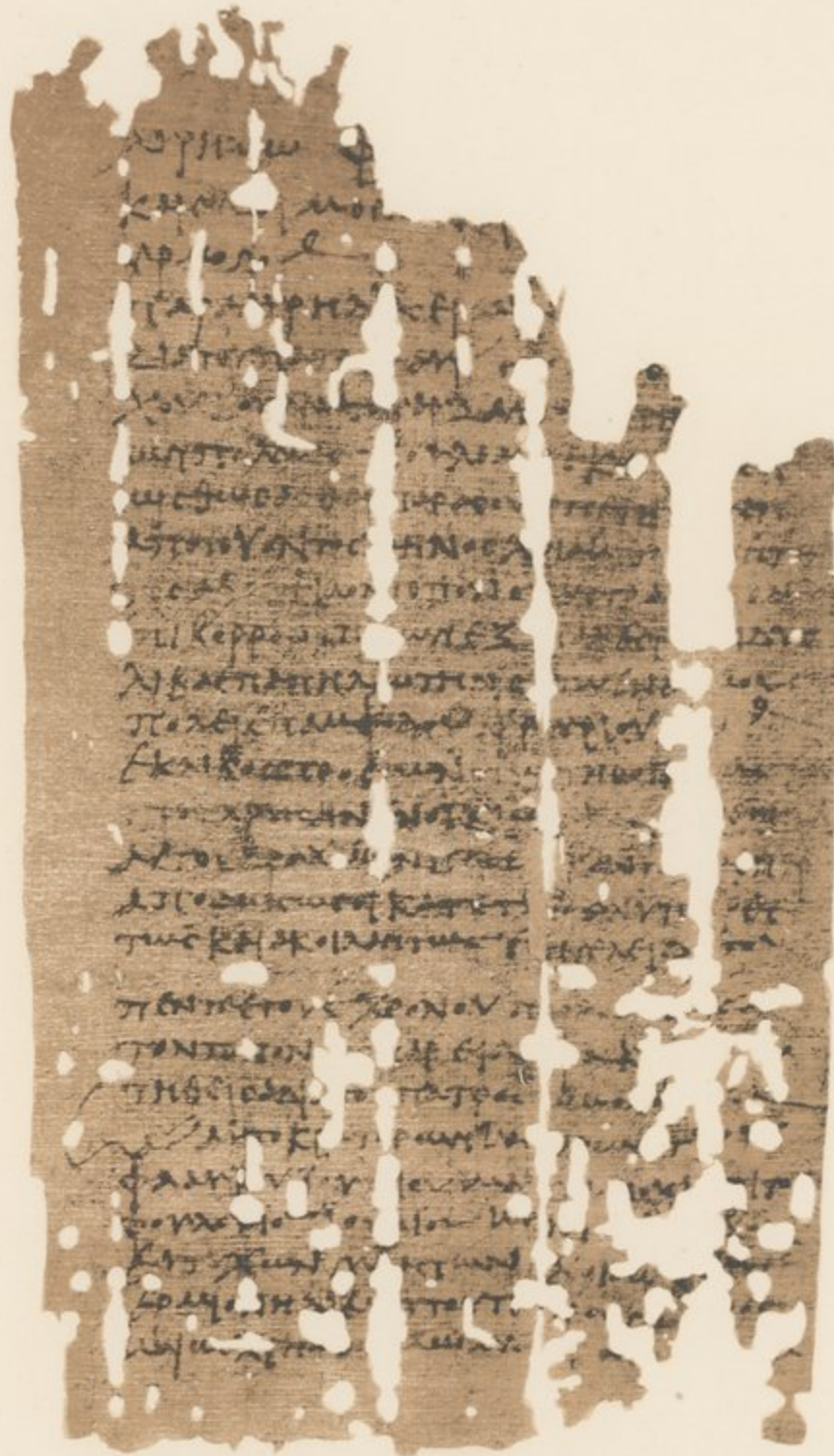

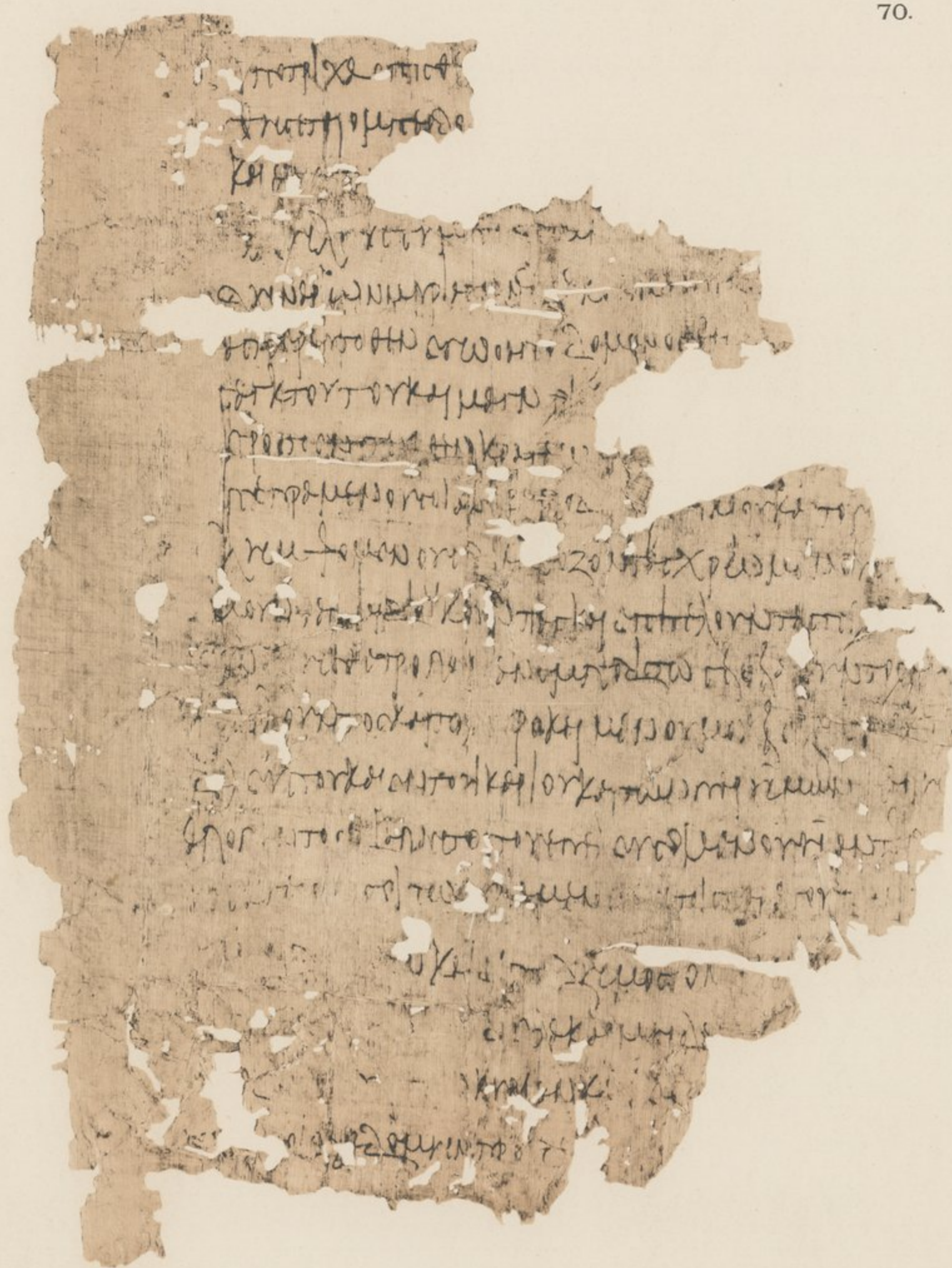


