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## TENN. PRISONS HELL HOLES REPORT SHOWS

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—In a report released March 18th the Tennessee Legislature's Penal Committee is forced to admit that conditions in the Brushy Mountain Prison and the main Penitentiary at Nashville are worse than in the Siberian prisons under the Czar before the revolution.

The report tells of women prisoners at the Nashville Pen being handcuffed and hung from pegs on the wall for 10 to 12 hours because they were unable to put out enough work in the hosiery mill to satisfy the slave driving warden. Both men and women prisoners are stripped to the waist and lashed into unconsciousness by the whipping boss for the slightest infraction of rules the committee found.

### Prison A Fire Trap

In the Brushy Mountain branch of the main prison the committee reports 976 men crowded into a frame building to hold less than a third this number. Over 300 of the prisoners have venereal diseases, contracted in most cases since they entered the prison as deceased prisoners are not segregated. At the present 138 are down with pneumonia and flu without medical attention and left in their beds to die as the warden claims he has no adequate hospital to house and care for them.

The Brushy Mountain prison is a regular fire trap and a fire here would result in "a tragedy at Brushy Mountain the like of which has never been seen in an American prison. The wiring on this old structure is of the most dangerous character and is liable at any time to cause a fire." Under present conditions in case of fire hundreds of men would die like rats in a trap without a chance for their lives.

Despite these horrible conditions, which it is forced to admit because unable to conceal them, the committee does its best to whitewash the prison administration, stating that "the conditions which exist at Brushy Mountain are in no sense the fault of the commissioner of institutions nor of Capt. W. H. Nelson, warden."

## NTWU Nat. Council To Meet

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—The National Council of the National Textile Workers Union will convene here at Union Hall for a two day session starting April 4th.

The call for the meeting of the Council, signed by Pat Devine, Secretary of the union, calls on all districts to elect delegates and to turn the Council meeting into a "small national convention."

The call points out that the recent great strikes led to victory by the N. T. W. In Lawrence and Maynard have again fired the textile workers of the whole industry with the will to struggle against the present unbearable conditions. Over 2,000 workers have joined the union in the last few weeks as a result of these struggles, the call states, and the union now has a firm mass base which will enable it to develop the work of organization of the coming strikes more rapidly than before.

## 115 Jailed in Orleans Strike; Mass Picketing Starts On Call M.W.I.U.

### BULLETIN

New Orleans, La.—Harold Hynes, National Secretary of the Marine Workers' Industrial Union, and H. Harvey, National Organizer for the Union, were sentenced to ten days in jail for violation of the Federal Injunction against mass picketing Saturday. The organizers were charged with distributing leaflets signed by the union calling on the 5,000 longshoremen to mass picket on the docks and keep out the scabs as the only way to win the strike.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—35 striking longshoremen are held here charged with violation of the Federal injunction which prohibits strikers from coming near the docks where scabs are working to break the strike. Trial of the 35 strikers is set for Thursday.

The charges against the 35 strikers, most of whom are Negroes, came as a result of a mass picketing demonstration of several hundred strikers on the docks last Wednesday. At that time 115 were arrested when the police attacked the strikers with clubs and with machine guns set up along

## "NO NIGGERS" SAYS A.F.L.

## Fight Lynch Law on 28th

NEW YORK CITY—Declaring that "We don't take niggers into our union," a business agent for the Sheet Metal Workers Union of the American Federation of Labor, fired Maurice Barcourt, a colored metal worker, off the new Waldorf-Astoria building job.

Barcourt was approached on the job by the A. F. of L. union business agent who asked to see his union card. He showed him a card in the Metal Workers Industrial League, one of the revolutionary unions affiliated to the Trade Union Unity League, which fights against all forms of discrimination against Negroes. When Barcourt was told by the business agent that this card was no good on the job he offered to join the A. F. of L. union in order to hold his job. He was contemptuously told that the A. F. of L. Union takes no "niggers" as members.

On March 28th tens of thousands of workers throughout America will gather in great demonstrations against lynching, deportation of foreign-born workers and against all forms of discrimination against Negroes.

The demonstrations are called by the League for Struggle for Negro Rights as a protest against the new wave of bosses' terror and lynchings which is sweeping the country. Other fighting organizations of the workers are co-operating.

On this Day of Protest Negro and white workers at hundreds of great mass meetings will demonstrate the unbreakable solidarity of the working class and the determination of the Negro and white workers to fight shoulder to shoulder against all attacks of the bosses and for full equality for the Negroes.

## Mob Lynches Miss. Negro

INVERNESS, Miss.—Steve Wiley, Negro farm worker, was lynched by a mob of white business men here early Sunday. The usual lying charge against Wiley was that he "attempted to attack a white woman."

Police officials are clearly implicated in the affair as they covered up all reports of the lynching until Tuesday, evidently to give time to the lynchers to prepare an alibi. No arrests have been made and probably none will be.

The strikers are becoming desperate and armed clashes between strikers and scabs take place daily. The longshoremen are beginning to see the sell-out their leaders of the I. L. A. and the A. F. of L. are preparing for them. They are beginning to realize that the present policy of the leadership which forbids mass picketing and any fighting attempt to keep scabs off the docks, is losing their strike and must be changed to the militant policy of mass picketing despite the injunction proposed to the strikers by the Marine Workers Industrial Union.

The correct policy of the MWIU is winning more and more strikers to its program and they are putting the strike policies of the MWIU into effect in spite of the opposition of the leaders.

## WORKERS VOTE RED DESPITE BOSSES TRICKS

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—Mack Coads, Communist candidate for Judge in the city elections, received 128 votes according to figures given out by the Board of Elections. Ledford, candidate for Mayor is credited with 99 votes and Cassidy, running for City Commissioner, with 118.

**Vote Stealing Probable**  
Unquestionably many votes were stolen from the Communist candidates. The whole course of the campaign which saw the arrests of three leading organizers and the placing of prohibitive bail on them to insure that they remained in jail until after elections; the failure of either the Chattanooga Times or the News to print the names of the Communist candidates on the sample ballots appearing in these papers (this is most important as no party designation appears on the ballot and the workers must remember the names of the candidates they wish to vote for), the refusal to allow the Communist candidates to speak at many mass meetings where all other candidates were invited to speak; the raid on a Communist rally on the eve of the elections and the arrest of one of the candidates, Comrade Coads, who was held in jail with bail denied him until af-

## CROPPERS FIGHT BACK IN ARK

### One Killed By Overseer

MARION, Ark.—Mose Miller, Negro cropper died in the County jail here March 21st as a result of wounds received in a gun battle with L. H. Glover, manager of a large plantation near here on which he worked.

Glover attacked the cropper with a gun because he protested against attempts to cheat him at the plantation store. Miller defended himself from the brutal attack and killed Glover, only to die later from wounds he received in the fight.

Jodie and Jack Miller, sons of the cropper, are held in jail at Wynne, Ark. Tho they had nothing to do with the fight they will probably be charged with murder and sent to their deaths as a warning to other croppers not to resist the brutal rule of the white master class.

### STATEMENT OF MACK COADS

"In answer to the statements in the Chattanooga Times of March 17th, and 18th, supposed to be made by me to a Times reporter, I wish to state that these so-called "statements" are lies from beginning to end. At no time did I tell a Times reporter or anyone else that I would forsake the Communist Party if Judge Fleming did not sentence me to the workhouse. This lie is nothing but a part of the whole campaign against the organizations of the workers carried on by the bosses' press of Chattanooga. I will always remain a loyal member of the Communist Party, fighting in the front ranks of the working class against unemployment and oppression and for the final victory of my class."

## Chattanooga Trial Set March 31

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—The trial of Mary Dalton, Harry Gordon and Elizabeth Lawson, originally set for March 19th, has been continued until March 31st. The postponement was obtained due to the absence from town on the 19th of the defense attorney, G. W. Chamlee, Sr., employed by the International Labor Defense to defend the three leaders of the Chattanooga workers.

The three were arrested when police broke up a demonstration of 3,000 unemployed workers on Feb. 10th. The workers had gathered at Main and Market streets to elect a committee to visit Mayor Bass to place the demands the jobless for immediate cash relief before the city government. Tens of police and special deputies charged the demonstration with drawn guns, arresting 12. All except Dalton, Gordon and Lawson were later released.

In addition to the usual frame up charges of vagrancy and inciting to

riot placed against the three organizers, Dalton and Gordon are also charged with living together while unmarried. That this charge is a plain and simple attempt of the police to prejudice the jury against the workers on trial, and to make railroading them to long terms in prison easier, is proven by the fact that these comrades were married in 1929 in New York City. The labor-hating police of Chattanooga are ready to stoop to any means to frame up the militant leaders of the working class.

The International Labor Defense, which is conducting the defense of the organizers, calls on the workers of Chattanooga, white and colored, to jamb the court room of Judge Lusk in the County Courthouse when the case comes up for trial, to show the boss-controlled city government that arrests and persecutions can never smash the struggle of the hungry masses for work or Unemployment Insurance.

## WHITE RULERS DENY NEGROES SCHOOLING IN BLACK BELT

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Only one Negro out of every 21 enrolling in the first grades of Alabama public schools reaches the eighth grade, according to figures given out by the United States office of education.

82,192 Negro children were enrolled in the first grades of Alabama schools in the school year of 1927-28. The same year 3,748 Negro children were enrolled in the eighth grade. While there were over 82 thousand first grade pupils the report shows only 29,402 in the second grade. In other words out of those Negro children who are fortunate enough to get any schooling, close to two-thirds of those who start school are freed to quit before they reach the second grade. The number in the higher grades grows progressively smaller until the eighth grade with only 3,748 pupils is reached.

The ratio for the rest of the South is about the same as in Alabama. For the South as a whole out of 3,212,900 Negro children of school age the average attendance at school is only 1,636,144 or much less than 50 per cent. In other words less than half of the Southern Negroes get any school training at all.

### Ruling Class Keeps Semi-Slaves In Ignorance

That depriving Negro children of any education is a conscious policy of the white ruling class is graphically shown by conditions in the Alabama Black Belt. In Gastonburg there is a school for white children with two well trained instructors in charge of 15 pupils. The Negro school in the same town houses about 70 pupils all of whom are taught by one Negro girl. The school term for the white children is 9 months while for the Negro children it is 3 months.

The big plantation owners of the Black Belt are determined that their semi-slaves, the Negro croppers on the plantations, shall have no education which might equip them to conduct a better fight against the existing slave conditions.

The usual bunk about the "mental inferiority of the Negroes" which is fed to the white workers in the South to divide them from the Negro workers, has its only basis of fact in conditions such as these whereby the Negroes are deprived of any opportunity to learn, even to read and write.

### Lying Statements In Chattanooga Times

The lengths to which the bosses candidates with the cooperation of the local capitalist press and radio station, went to prevent the workers of Chattanooga from voting Communist can be shown by a few facts. Following this whole campaign of terror a reporter from the Chattanooga Times approached Comrade Coads in his cell in the City jail on election night and asked him for a statement on the campaign. Coads issued a statement declaring that the smashing of the election rally at which he was arrested and the jailing of a total of five Communist leaders just before the election, indicated that the bosses were on the run and afraid of the large Communist vote which would result from the elections the next day. Coads also stated that despite arrests and persecutions aimed at outlawing the organizations of the workers the Communist Party would intensify its activity following the elections and would win new thousands of Chattanooga workers to its support.

After promising to print this statement the Times reporter himself wrote an entirely new statement which was printed as coming from Comrade Coads in which Coads is quoted as stating that if Judge Fleming did not send him to the chain gang he would renounce the "doc-

## GERMAN RED LEADER KILLED

HAMBURG, Germany—Ernst Henning, Communist member of the Hamburg City Legislature, was murdered by three fascists, March 15th, while returning home from a political meeting in an auto bus.

The murderers, members of the reactionary National Socialist Party (Facists), fired six shots into comrade Henning's body before he fell and then as he lay dead fired nine more shots into his body. Three of the last shots went wild and wounded two women and a child, also passengers on the bus.

This latest outrage follows a whole series of murders of leading Communist fighters by the Fascist murderer gangs which are supported and maintained by some of the biggest German capitalists. Hundreds of memorial meetings in honor of Comrade Henning have been held throughout the whole country at which scores of thousands of German workers have pledged themselves to intensify the fight against the boss class terror, under the leadership of the German Communist Party.

The Communist members of the German Reichstag have demanded that the workers defense organizations, the Red Front Fighters League, which the government has declared illegal, be allowed to function openly to protect the workers and their meetings from the Fascist gunmen.

The government on the contrary is doing all possible to protect the murderers and has banned all Communist papers in Hamburg and has prohibited all Communist meetings and demonstrations in an attempt to prevent the mobilization of the revolutionary workers for the defense of their Party.

## Murder Five As Prisoners Demand Food

JOILET, Ill.—5 unarmed prisoners murdered, shot down by brutal guards in cold blood. This is the record of the State Pen here in the last few weeks.

The first murders came when prison guards ambushed and deliberately killed with machine guns two men who were trying to escape. Of course the guards knew of the escape plans and could have stopped it without bloodshed before it started, but they preferred to lie in wait and murder 2 prisoners.

The third death came when a prisoner died from the effects of torture after having been left for hours suspended by handcuffs from a peg on the wall in the punishment cell.

The prisoners revolted against this inhuman regime of murder and cruelty and in the resulting "riot" two more prisoners were mowed down by machine guns.

As this is written the prisoners in the two state prisons here are locked in their cells on a diet of bread and water. Cries of the men demanding food ring throughout the prison and further revolts may break out at any time.

## Soviet Exports Up 14% Last Year When All Others Fail

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Figures released by the commerce department last week show that exports from the Soviet Union jumped up 14 per cent to a total of \$501,000,000 last year. This tremendous gain in exports in a period when, due to the economic crisis, the exports of all capitalist countries without exception fell off badly shows clearly the great advantages of socialist planned production over the hit or miss methods of capitalism. The Soviet Union is the one country in the world which has escaped the effects of the world crisis and where there is literally no unemployment.

Wheat exports in particular showed a sensational rise last year. 34,149,594 bushels were exported in 1930. In 1929 exactly thirty-seven bushels were exported. The great increase in the wheat crop which made these figures possible came largely as a result of the reorganization of Russian agriculture on a socialist basis thru the development of huge collective farms. The position of the Russian farmer on one of the great collectives is in striking contrast to that of the American farmers, millions of whom face starvation this year, because under capitalism the workers are paid such low wages they cannot buy the cotton and wheat the farmers produced.

### Convict Labor Here

At a time when hundreds of thousands of Tennessee workers are faced with starvation because they cannot find jobs the committee reports that the main prison turned in a profit of \$100,000 to the state last year from the sale of hosiery and other products of prison labor. At the same time the Brushy Mountain mines, manned by prisoners under the lash of brutal guards, is producing coal widely sold throughout the state which results in hundreds more Tennessee miners being thrown out of their jobs. In the mines and prison shops the convicts are driven at top speed for 12 and 14 hours a day and if unable to carry out the big tasks assigned them they are tortured and whipped. And in the face of this the government has the nerve to talk of "convict labor" in the Soviet Union!

It is to these hell-holes that the state is making every effort to send Harry Gordon, Mary Dalton and Elizabeth Lawson for long terms.

## Seek To Bar S. U. Products

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—A movement to bar importation into this country of all goods made in the Soviet Union will be started at once by the Southern States Protective League, officials of this organization announced at a conference here March 18th. This move is in support of the general campaign against the Soviet Union, which is led in this country by Senator Ham Fish.

In the statement of the League officials the old outworn lie about "convict labor" in workers Russia is repeated. This lie has been exposed

time and again by the Russian workers themselves and by American and other workers who have spent months and years in the Soviet Union.

The attack on the Soviet Union by this organization of open shippers is backed up by a tirade against the workers Fatherland appearing in the missnamed Birmingham Labor Advocate, last week. In every campaign of lies against the Soviet Union the A. F. of L. traitors run at the head of the pack, excelling the most reactionary open-shoppers in their lies about the First Workers State.

## German CP Gains New Members

BERLIN, Germany—Latest figures show that the German Communist Party has recruited 84,664 new members in the past four months. Following the tremendous success of the Party in the Reichstag (roughly corresponding to the United States Congress) elections, the Central Committee of the Party gave the districts the task of doubling their membership in six months. It now seems certain that the quota will be reached. In the last national elections over four and a half million German workers voted for Communist candidates.

## CODER, HURST BACK IN DALLAS

DALLAS, Texas.—Coder and Hurst, leaders of the Dallas unemployed who were beaten and tortured by a gang of klansmen with the cooperation of the local police, are returning to testify before the grand jury supposed to be investigating the cowardly attack.

The kind of "investigation" this will be is shown by the attitude of the Mayor who has declared that "any Communist demonstration held on the return of Coder and Hurst will be broken up by the police. There will be no more demonstrations in Dallas." Police are being mobilized and equipped with tear gas bombs and machine guns to smash any attempt of the workers to protest the present terror regime. Despite the police terror the workers of Dallas will continue the struggle for work or bread.

## Textile Worker Docked For Fake Jobless Relief

GREENVILLE, S. C.—The Woodside Mill here, which boasts of being the "largest cotton mill under one roof in the world," just pulled a stunt hard to beat.

For 7 weeks they took 25 and 50 cents from each workers pay envelope and with this money claimed they would buy groceries for the unemployed. No workers are on the committee handling the money or buying the groceries and distributing them. No one knows how much of the money "collected" (it amounts to stealing it) from the workers was grafted by the committee of the mill management.

The workers who are forced to contribute 25 to 50 cents are paid \$4 to \$10 a week. Their own families are without enough to eat but out of their starvation wages they give to the unemployed while the bosses who have the money and should be giving, refuse to part with a red cent. It's time to put a stop to this and thru an organized fight force the bosses to come across with Unemployment Insurance for every worker out of job with bosses and not the workers footing the bill. Just a few words for the blacklisted workers of Elizabethton. I don't know any of them for I came here after the last strike.

I do know that every time a blacklisted worker puts in his or her application for a job, they take it up with the committee who always says they are no good.

This committee is not worth a cent for us workers. There is a committee in every department and the other day the wash room men on two shifts wanted a raise in wages and two of the committee was for it and one was against it, and the one man won over the two men. I don't work in the wash room, but if I had I would have beat hell out of that committee man.

I work in the spinning room and we run from 2 1/4 to 3 1/4 machines and if a spinner is off the boss divides his machine with 6 of us and sometimes gives us an hour extra. That means getting an eight hour job done for six hours. Why not have some extra spinners for this. There are plenty in town that can spin.

I have noticed plenty of boys and girls of 12 and 14 years old that come in here to work.

The company thinks I don't know anything about striking, but I do. I was in the Gastonia N. C. strike and we had a real one too. I bet when we get our plans laid we will show the company that they can't buy out the National Textile Workers Union, for it stands for the workers 100 per cent. ITS A FIGHTING UNION.

he got out, but was left to starve.

He came back to Galveston a very sick man. The railroad doctor would not give him a clean bill of health, so he was left here to die of starvation. In his weakened condition he fainted on the streets and was brought to the John Seeley Hospital.

He did not have any money, so the Immigration officials were notified. They came to the hospital when he was well enough to leave there. They put him in jail and had him deported.

The big companies suck the life blood out of the workers and then throw them into the ash can like an old shoe.

## HAVE LENIN CORNER IN PINOCA MILL

CHAD-HOS MILL  
WORKERS GET  
15% WAGE CUT

I am a slave of the Chadwick-Hoskins Co.

We are working 55 hours 30 minutes per week for the great sum of \$11 to \$16 per week, yet they want us to work still another half hour each day. Starting time is 6:30 and we are supposed to get an hour for dinner and stop off at 5:30 P. M., but they start the work about ten minutes to six in the morning, 12:35 at noon and part of the mills run until six in the evening. The worst part of it is we have to do all this work for not even a decent living wage.

They cut wages here a few weeks ago. They said they were going to cut down from 10 per cent to 15 per cent but they cut nearer 15 per cent than 10 per cent.

And on top of this the bosses come around and raise hell about production and seconds. If you can't get 95% production and less than 2% seconds they take your looms from you.

There is only one remedy for this oppression. Organize and fight as one.

Mill Boss Fools,  
Cheats, Evicts,  
Pregnant Mother

I want to tell you something about how the mill bosses treat us poor workers here in Charlotte. For more than a year now I have been working in the Calvine Mill when they would let me work.

Last fall we were cut down to three days each week. That is all the work we women could get. Our husbands couldn't get any thing to do. And we women only made three and four dollars for the three days. This we had to pay house rent and live on.

A week before Christmas the overseer came to me and said he was going to do me a favor. He noticed that I was soon to have a baby, so he said he would let me work a whole week instead of three days as I used to work. I was glad to do this for I knew I would soon be confined. But when I went to get the pay, what do you think, they wouldn't pay me a cent. They said they would hold this for future house rent to take care of the time I was confined. I had money enough coming to me to pay the rent until the second week in May. But now I have been served with an eviction notice and told to get out today.

My baby will be born in a few days and here I am being set out on the street by the Calvine mill bosses, one of the chain of the Hoskin-Chadwick mills. My rent is paid up till the second week in May but the sheriff has already been here with a notice to vacate at once.

Now what are we workers to do under such circumstances. I don't see anything for us to do but to organize. We workers must not move just because the boss tells us to. We can't live out doors, and the boss sure will put us there rent or no rent when ever he wants to unless we fight back. Workers get together and fight back. The National Textile Workers Union sure puts up a fight for its members. All workers in the mills should join and support it.

ATLANTA, Ga.—Over 250 electrical workers and linemen of the Georgia Power Co., struck their jobs March 19th in protest against the companies policy of firing union men.

The men are organized in the Electrical Workers Union, a part of the A. F. of L. If the strikers are to win they will have to fight both the company and the corrupt leadership of their own organization.

CLASSES HELD

The Pinoca Mill here, one of the Darlington Fabric Corporation, with other mills at Newton N. J., has just about shut down operation. They are now laying off hands due to the fact that there are no orders coming in.

Some weavers have to stay in the mill all day long with only one loom, which means about \$1.25 a day.

There is only one dipper and one water stand in the whole weave room. This is some system of sanitation. We workers wonder where the Charlotte Health officers are that are supposed to look after such things.

We also have a Lenin Corner in the Pinoca mill where we keep clippings and pictures from the workers papers pasted, such as articles from the Daily Worker, Southern Worker, Labor Unity, etc. The boss doesn't dare to say anything about this. We also hold classes in Trade Union work and Communism right in the mill during lunch hour.

Anyway we workers have learned not to expect anything from the capitalists and their government. We are now joining the NTWU and have had a good local of the NTWU here for some time. We want other workers in the other mills to join in with us so we all can tell the bosses where to get off.

For 40 Hour Wk.

We workers, here in Charlotte, who have been stretched out and speeded up so much until we can hardly go, have been handed another wage cut this week. The Hoskin-Chadwick mills employing about 600 workers have worked out a nice scheme to cut the wages of us workers. This time they are putting us on a 13 hour day with 6 1/2 hours for each shift—six days per week. This means that we will work about 40 hours a week for \$4.

The more we workers stand for this stuff the more the bosses will pile it up on us. They don't give a damn about us and it is time we should know this and get busy and put a stop to it. We must all get together and organize and let the boss know that we won't stand this slavery any longer. We must not be afraid of our jobs. We don't have any jobs to lose. If we don't work we starve and if we work we starve. And I think we can live longer by not working.

Workers lets get busy and organize. The National Textile Workers Union is the fighting Union that has just won victories for the workers in Lawrence, Mass. And what they did there we can do here if only we get busy. Every worker in the Textile mills must join the NTWU and fight like hell against the speed up and the wage cuts.

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## Is This Convict Labor Mr. Fish?

The Southern Protective Tariff League, as reported elsewhere in this issue, has recently added its voice to the pack who are howling for a ban on the importation into the United States of all products manufactured in the Soviet Union on the grounds that "convict labor" is used there.

The current issue of the Birmingham Labor Advocate carried a front page editorial denouncing the "rule of Tyrant Stalin" in the Soviet Union and demanding that all products produced there be barred from the United States. The Labor Advocate seems all excited about the terrible situation in Russia where, as it says, "Men work to eat, and no work means no eats." What a horrible thought for these traitors who dare to call themselves "labor leaders" who edit the Labor Advocate! Under such conditions their good friends and masters, the capitalists, would actually have to go to work if they cared to eat! The Labor Advocate of course follows the lead of the boss class, which owns this sheet body and soul, and fairly froths at the mouth on the subject of "convict labor" in the Soviet Union.

How these gentlemen like to repeat this lie which has been exposed again and again! How the whole pack, led by that hypocritical liar and fool, U. S. Senator, Ham Fish, delight in shedding tears over the non-existent "convict labor" in the Soviet Union! But these lying whelps find it quite convenient to ignore the convict labor in the United States, which stinks to high heaven with the torture and murder of the men and women who slave in American Prison shops, in Prison mines and on the brutal chain gang.

Let Fish and the whole tribe who repeat with him the lie of convict labor in the Soviet Union, take a look in their own back yard. How about the Nashville pen, where women are hung

from pegs in the wall by their hands until unconscious because they can't stand the pace in the hosiery mill?—the same mill that turned in a profit of \$100,000 to the state last year by selling prison made goods to private contractors. How about the Brushy Mountain prison mines in Tennessee where half starved convicts under the lash of prison guards mine the coal which throws more Tennessee miners out of their jobs? How about the new road thru Huntsville, Ala., where convict gangs work at the doorsteps of the farmers who paid the taxes to build the road, and are now literally starving because they can't get work?

Is this convict labor or is it not Mr. Fish? It is, and you, together with your friends on the Labor Advocate know it is. But you keep silent and the workers will understand your silence quite well. You keep silent because this convict labor is in capitalist America; because it is carried on by the same bosses government which owns you. And you lie about convict labor in the Soviet Union because there the workers rule. There the big and little fishes who oppressed the Russian workers have been kicked out, or else "must work to eat." This is what worries you Mr. Fish, and worries the gentlemen in the Southern Protective Tariff League, and worries those scoundrels who edit the Labor Advocate. Because of this you shed your lying tears over "Russian convict labor," in order to prepare the masses for war against the Soviet Union which you hate.

But the workers will not be deceived. They will answer your lying attacks on the Fatherland of all workers by rallying to the defense of the Soviet Union in increasing numbers, and by preparing for the struggle which will smash your rotten system which makes convict labor a reality in the United States!

## Movie Whips Up Lynch Spirit

Having heard so much about the "Birth of a Nation" the motion picture and knowing it would be of interest to other workers to know what it meant, we went to see it. Its lesson comrades is indeed a serious one and one which every class conscious worker should understand and expose. The picture itself was first shown in 1914 and is acclaimed by the boss press as the greatest film of all time.

This picture deals with the South during and after the Civil War. It is calculated to rouse the most intense Negro hating prejudices among those who see it—by picturing the poor Negro slaves who had been "freed" by the Northern capitalists, during the Civil War, as brutal savages, whose greatest desire was to rape or marry a white woman. The picture shows how the Northern capitalists sent their agents, the carpetbaggers down to the South to capture the Negro vote—to fool and deceive them. Thus to use them as tools against any resistance on the part of the Southern landlords to the policies of the Northern bosses. The murderous bloody KKK is pictured as the "Savior" of the South under the banner of the "Holy Cross" and such lies.

The significance of the widely heralded revival of this picture is of extreme importance at this time. Throughout the South this picture is playing—in Dallas Texas, where our comrades were nearly lynched for fighting for the rights of both Negro and White workers against starvation. Its purpose is very plain. The Communist Party is rallying the masses of White and Negro toilers, workers and farmers, together for a joint fight against the starvation and misery of this rotten

ten capitalist system and bosses are using this picture to stir up and arouse within the white workers of the South especially—and of the North as well—the poison of race prejudice, to stir up a lynch mob spirit, to glorify and prepare the ground for the fascist KKK bands as present day "saviors," and thus smash the growing unity of white and Negro toilers against starvation, discrimination, and worsening conditions. The bosses full well realize that the lessons of unemployment, starvation, wage cuts, speed-up and bosses terror is forcing white and negro workers together.

Further this picture shows that the capitalist, will and is, using all means press, radio, church, films and so forth in order to spread their propaganda and their racial poison. The crowd, mostly made up of bosses and small business men (as most workers sure couldn't afford the price) cheered and clapped at the various vicious scenes.

Every class conscious worker—white and negro—must expose this latest most vicious attack on the Negro toilers and on the working class as a whole. Our answer must be increased organization into the ranks of all working class organizations—above all the Communist Party, and the wiping out of any trace of white chauvinism. Workers—rally your friends and shopmates to the mass Protest Demonstrations on March 28 against Lynchings, Deportations, and bosses terror! Show the bosses the force of our organized protest against the near lynching of comrades Hurst and Coder in Dallas, Texas, and the bosses attempt to deport the militant worker Yokininen.

He also said some countries took 700 years to get their liberty and that the American Negro was just beginning to wake up and fight for his. I agreed with him that the Negroes are just beginning to wake up but in a quite different sense than what he thinks. We are beginning to get wise to the traitors in our ranks like Mr. DePriest.

DePriest Admits Communists Practice Equality

Then he raised his voice as if angry and warned the Negroes against Communism. He advised not to mix with these "damnable reds" because they are attempting to overthrow "our" government—(Just how is the government which oppressed us and denies us every right "our" Government Mr. DePriest?). He said the Communists are just fooling the Negroes by getting them on their side by preaching social equality and by practicing it at dances of Negroes and Whites in New York City—(You don't believe in practicing what you preach

## Garment Workers Sold Out by AF of L

ATLANTA, Ga.—200 striking workers of the Marcus Loeb Overall Co., went back to work Monday.

The workers were sent back to the job after an agreement to "arbitrate" the wage cut proposed by the company had been reached by the United Garment Workers Union. Such agreements to "arbitrate" are almost always followed by a decision by the arbitration committee in favor of the bosses.

It is to be expected that due to the treacherous act of the union officials in ordering the strikers back to work and in submitting the dispute to arbitration, that a wage cut will be forced on the workers. The Trade Union Unity League, in a leaflet distributed to the strikers, had warned them against such a sell-out and had called on the workers to take control of the strike themselves and to carry it thru to victory.

## Mexican Jobless Forced To Eat Grass Many Die

HERMOSILLO, Mexico.—Twelve jobless workers entered a restaurant here last week and ordered a large meal. After their hunger was satisfied they told the restaurant owner to "charge it to the government," as they had no money.

A number of starving workers have died in this town recently from the effects of eating grass in a futile effort to stave off starvation. These workers are principally Mexicans who have been deported from the United States. An American College professor recently recommended that the unemployed of this country eat alfalfa to avoid starving to death. But the workers of Mexico and the United States will not follow this cynical "advice." They will continue to organize the struggle for Unemployment Insurance at the expense of the government and the employers.

## M.W.I.L. Calls For Struggle

Crane Enamel Works of Chattanooga are beginning a campaign of laying off workers in every department. Sixty were laid off last week and now the mill threatens to close down within a month. This will add 750 workers to the already large number of unemployed in Chattanooga. The Metal Workers Industrial League has issued a leaflet calling on the workers to organize Shop Committees and Unemployed Councils.

## Wage Cut In Exposition

The Exposition Mill will put a wage cut of fifteen per cent on the workers this week. This mill ordinarily hires 2500 workers and now has only 500 on the job. The terrible degree of poverty in which the workers of the Exposition Mill have been thrust can be judged by the fact that every single retail store within five blocks of the mill have either moved or gone bankrupt. The workers of the mill must peddle fruit in the streets in order to keep alive.

## STARVING FARMER KILLS SELF

RUTHERFORDTON, N. C.—Facing starvation with a family of six to feed, R. Coy Price, 25 year old white farmer, killed himself with a shotgun. A few days ago he told his wife it was as much as he could do to keep from killing himself, so worried was he where the next days food would come from.

## Protest Terror On March 28th!
