War Moves On Soviet Union Growing

N. A. A. C. P. DENIES PATTERSON FLOOR AT CONVENTION

Pickens Causes Arrest of Eight Chicago Workers

Mrs. Janie Patterson, mother of one of the Scottsboro boys, was denied the floor at the National Convention in Pittsburgh of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which claims to be "defending the boys."

The N.A.A.C.P., which is responsible for the retaining of the Klux lawyer and drunkard Koddy, who helped to send the boys to the electric chair, thus again gives proof to the workers that it is not at all interested in saving the boys, but is cooperating with the boss men of the South in sending them to the electric chair.

Just like Rev. Brown of the Chattanooga Ministers Alliance and Dr. Stevens of the same outfit, they are calling directly upon the police to break up the mass defense movement led by the International Labor Defense and the League of Struggle for Negro Rights. The N.A.A.C.P., is also directly cooperating with the police. On charges against the father, Oscar DePue and officers of the N. A.A.C.P., branch in Chicago, eight workers were sentenced to six months in jail for heckling William Pickens at a meeting. After Wm. Pickens was thru viciously attacking the Committee and the mass defense movement and calling upon the Negroes to have faith in the Alabama lynch court which has already sentenced the boys to the electric chair, workers in the audience demanded the right to speak and expose his lies and slander. Pickens and other Judas' present immediately called in the police and had the workers arrested.

All the mothers of the boys are now already in the North or on the way to speak at large meetings and demonstrations organized by the I. L. D. and the League of Struggle for Negro Rights. Mrs. Janie Patterson is in Pittsburgh speaking before the strikers' miners and other workers. Mrs. Norris has left for Detroit, Mrs. Williams for Cleveland and Mrs. Wright is in New York.

Int'l Protest On Scottsboro

Workers throughout the world are being aroused to the Scottsboro outrage and have joined the mass protest and defense movement. The Communist Party of Cuba has passed a resolution protesting the lynch law verdict and calling upon the Cuban workers to demand the immediate release of the boys and a new trial before a jury of workers and farmers, at least half to be Negroes, and with no whites with anti-Negro prejudice permitted on it.

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Stone U. S. A. Consulate In Berlin

BERLIN, Germany—Several hundred young workers demonstrated in front of the American Consulate Office here for the third time protesting against the legal lynching of the nine Negro boys in Scottsboro, Ala. The demonstration was led by the Young Communist League of Germany. Several windows were broken and demands were thrown into the office calling for the release of the boys and proclaiming the faith of the young German workers in their innocence. Placards which read: "Down with American Lynch Justice! Long Live the Solidarity of the Negro and White Workers! Negro Workers Support the Communist Party of the United States of America!" and similar slogans were displayed. Several arrests were made by the police.

The German Communist Party is carrying on an intense agitation throughout Germany calling for international working class solidarity in the defense of the Scottsboro, Alabama boys. Every step taken by the League of Struggle for Negro Rights and the International Labor Defense, leaders of the Scottsboro campaign, is made known to the German workers.

Louisiana Posse Murders Negro Worker

COVINGTON, La. (CNA)—Earl Lefrere, 35 years old Negro worker, was shot down in cold blood by Leonard Pinks and several other white men deputized by Deputy Sheriff John Shabrook to act with him.

The lynch "deputies" called at Lefrere's home and started to beat him up and abuse him. Lefrere was accused of wounding Deputy Sheriff Shabrook when the latter tried to beat him up. Shabrook thereupon deputized a mob as a posse and sent them to Lefrere's home to avenge the "insult" to white supremacy.

40,000 Strikers Hit U. M. W. of A. Strike-Breaking

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—The strike-breaking U.M.W. of A., which is attempting to break the strike of 40,000 miners in Penna.-Ohio-W. Va., was given a decisive blow when two hundred men who were working in the Pittsburgh Terminal Coal Co., walked out and joined the National Miners Union. The U.M.W. had patched up an agreement with the Terminal and Gov. Pinchot, which was hailed by the labor fakers as a "victory." The miners denounced this agreement over the heads of the rank and file, and even those who returned to work found that the conditions were worse than they had been before they walked out.

The UMWA organizers are being stoned and booted out of the mine towns where they try to hold meetings. The fakers are doing all in their power to break the strike and John L. Lewis, president of the UMWA, has written President Hoover a letter pleading with him to break the strike of the 40,000 miners. Hoover has ordered Secretary of Commerce Lamont and Secretary of Labor Donohue to call a conference of mine operators, scabs and the UMW to make a "settlement." The Central Rank and File Strike Committee has exposed this strike-breaking move and served notice that it will not abide by any decisions made by this conference.

Three more mines of the Peabody Coal Company in West Virginia have struck and a number of other small mines in Ohio and West Virginia are answering the call. Miners are marching on St. Clairsville, Ohio, in a hunger march demanding unemployment relief and relief for the strikers. Twenty thousand took part in the march on Pittsburgh last week.

We are spreading the National Miners Union over Harlan County like the dew.

Miners are flocking to the banner of the N.M.U. for they know a real organization by the fight we are staging in Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania. The militant miners in Harlan County hail the N.M.U. as the savior of the working class.

Already a couple of thousand have been admitted and others are clamoring for membership. We are unable to take care of the applicants and special committees have been appointed to assist and each member has been appointed an organizer.

Organizers are in every camp in the county. Meetings are being held daily. The operators are scared to death. Their backs are against the wall.

The fighting organization is and will do with actions, not with promises and prayers.

The U.M.W. of A. fakers are about giving up. Their members are deserting and joining the N.M.U. ranks.

Ten thousand miners will be in the ranks of the fighting National Miners Union by August 1st.

Croppers Resist Cutting off Food

Reports come from various parts of the Black Belt that the landlords are cutting off the croppers as soon as the crop is put by. The few pounds of falback, four and corn advanced to the croppers by the landlords while the crops were being planted—barely enough to keep from starving to death—are now being stopped, and the cropper must look out for himself until cotton picking time, if he remains alive until then or does not leave the land in desperation.

With the crops already planted, the landlord does not care if the cropper picks up his few belongings and goes elsewhere for something to eat. At a starvation wage, the boss can hire day laborers at picking time to take in the crop and keep it all for himself.

But the croppers have nowhere to

go. Starvation faces them no matter where they turn. They are forced to remain on the land, in their barren huts with their empty larders, with not a cent in cash with which to feed themselves and their families. The landlord's larders are full, he has on his boy plenty of provisions. He is deliberately attempting to starve the croppers off the land and take their crops.

But the cropper, the renter, the poor farmer—black and white—have only one way out. That is the way of struggle. After they have put the labor of their whole family into the soil from sun up to sundown putting the crops by, they are not going to sit idly by and see their families starve, while the crops are growing into profits for the bosses. Already the croppers are beginning to organ-

ize for a struggle.

The first mighty blow against the landlords must be struck now. Together with the renters, day laborers and poor farmers—who are also being starved by the same landlords—the croppers must demonstrate in front of the landlord's house, demanding that the food advances be continued until the crop is taken in. In this way we must serve notice upon the landlord that we do not intend to sit idly by and see him take all the fruits of our labor and let us starve.

This is the only kind of action that will get us something to eat. If one cropper goes by himself to the landlord's back door and says: "Please, Cap'n, I'm hungry, give me some corn," he will get nothing. If hundreds of croppers, black and white

Young Workers Rout Fascists In Charlotte

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—An open air meeting of the Young Communist League of Charlotte was attacked Monday night by a group of hoodlums dressed in a peculiar black uniform with white trimmings. The meeting took place at the foot of Eighth St., and the rats in uniform were too afraid to come close to the young workers so they took up a stand on a hill close by and began throwing huge rocks and bricks down upon the meeting in an attempt to break it up.

The speaker, Dave Does, continued the meeting while about fifty young workers present answered the assault by throwing back even larger rocks. The skulls on top of the hill were determined to hit the speaker as they kept on throwing rocks for about fifteen minutes until two young workers took up a stand close by the speaker and pointed guns in the direction of the rats on the hill. Under cover of the defense put up by the young workers, two young girl workers went up the hill in the direction of the rats and before this determined advance the spit-tickle tools of the bosses fled.

The meeting was continued in a close and was extremely enthusiastic. Many young workers present, particularly the young Negro workers, were won over entirely by the League. Many joined. The meeting ended with the singing of "Solidarity" and the waving of fists in the direction of the fleeing rats. This is the second time, meetings of the YCL have been attacked by bosses tools on this corner. Each time they were chased away.

The girls who went up the hill recognized one of the skulls as a certain Erklow, who owns considerable property in Charlotte. It is believed that the rats are part of a Fascist organization composed of bosses and landlords that are organized in a determined effort to prevent white and negro workers from organizing together for better conditions.

The young worker speakers at the meeting were Gertrude Golden, A. Black, Ralph Garrett and Does. Much literature was sold and many young workers pledged their support in a fight to free the Scottsboro Nine and against bosses wars.

POLICE, KKK, RAID HOMES IN GREENVILLE

GREENVILLE, S. C.—Police are searching workers' homes in an attempt to seize Communist literature. They have threatened to shoot some workers unless they leave town. The police claim they have found "a stack of literature and a pile of propaganda a foot high." They state there is "a membership of around 1000 in the Communist Party in Greenville."

The police raids follow announcement by the Woodside Mill, where workers strike for less than \$16 a week, of a 5% wage cut on July 9th. Workers at Woodside and other mills of Greenville have been urged by the National Textile Workers Union to organize and strike against such cuts, and against the stretchout. The reason for the recent police raids as stated in the local press, is "Officers were into possession of information causing them to believe that industrial disturbances planned by the party were dangerous." And it continues to say: "With the idea of preventing any trouble that might arise as a result of communist activities here, the officers are working on the case still further." The Woodside Mill company in the meantime is offering \$1 for the name of any worker who is a member of the National Textile Workers Union.

In April, a month after the Unemployed Council of Greenville had started organizing, the police department and the Ku Klux Klan started a campaign of terror to smash it and the N. T. W. U.

LYNCH LAW AT WORK

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.—Deputy Sheriff George Mangold, notorious for his numerous murders of Negro workers, shot and fatally wounded Edward R. Summers, Negro, after entering his home where a double wedding ceremony was taking place. Summers and his sister were being married when the deputy forced his way in and grabbed hold of Summers, pointing his gun at him. When asked what he wanted, the deputy shot Summers point-blank in the chest and dragged him out to his car. No action has been taken against the deputy.

COLEMBUS, Miss.—George McLain, 50 year old Negro, was beaten to death near here by a posse of white men in search for a supposed attacker of a white woman. McLain was the first Negro they came upon. The posse, consisting of 100, is terrifying the whole section. A later report said that the one who was being searched was a Negro farm worker who had burned a barn. In either case McLain's innocence was established.

GREENVILLE, S. C.—On the instigation of the white landlord the 17-year-old son of a Negro tenant farmer was arrested on the Augusta Road and charged with attacking a 5-year-old child.

GREENVILLE, S. C.—One young Negro worker has been arrested here and charged with criminal assault upon a white woman and a number of others have been arrested and held for investigation. The white woman who claims to have been attacked cannot identify any of them, nevertheless they are being held and the terror continues.

together, go to the front cover of the landlord's mansion all together and say: "We are starving. Give us food or we will take it"—that will be a different matter. The food will come fast enough.

Collective Farms In Soviet Union

By MAXIM GORKY

Almost half of the peasants have entered agricultural collectives.

What does this mean?
It means that 12,833,000 peasant families have decided to abandon their old life in which for centuries they have been accustomed to the rule of lords and landlords.

It means that in the Soviet Union the peasantry has actually been freed from penal servitude, from a poverty-stricken, dark life which for thousands of years kept them in the position of an inferior race.

It means that the peasantry which before were divided on little pieces of land, fruitlessly expending their strength in the wretched struggle with poverty, have now, taught by the Party of Bolshevik-Communists, felt themselves strong enough to appropriate all land as a single economic unit.

It means that twelve and one-half million peasant families, bound together in a single human unit, understand that individual labor has had its day and that it is advantageous and wise to join forces in one great agricultural industry.

It means that the peasantry have actually arrived at a plan of agricultural economy, such as the workers already had.

When this whole mass of peasants are organized in collective farms, applying their labor collectively, 25 million heads are amalgamated into one wise, economic head. That head plans in what regions, in what kind of soil will be sown wheat, where rye, where barley; in united tilling of the soil, it destroys weeds and parasites which voraciously suck the juice out of the soil like useless individuals used to suck the strength out of the peasantry. Armed with machines the peasantry sees how dear the horse cost it, how much of the soil was sown merely to feed the horse. The horizon of this united 25-million head widens beyond the narrow boundaries of a province, a region, to comprise the whole country and the new worker on the land sees all the monstrousness of his yesterdays, all the senselessness, the uselessness, of his accustomed ways.

Labor will become easier and easier there will be more and more free time left for the peasant to become acquainted with the world in which he lives, for self-education and culture. His children, taught in the universities, will build on the unfettered land our good roads, they will find still better fertilizer for the soil than they knew before; the children will

time feeding, let them know that you do not intend to allow them to take your crops, that you will also demand settlement when the crops are in. Fight now, demand food, and quick, too!

make over the crowded and dirty village into a city, where there will be good bathhouses, hospitals, bakeries, laundries, schools, theaters, clubs, where a new life will begin, created by the laboring people.

Such a life not beyond the mountains. It will be organized just as soon as the village woman understands how valuable for her is the kolchoz (collective farm) and how it will free her from the daily bondage which hitherto held her and bound her with all kinds of diseases. In former days, in individual agriculture, "babu" (mother) was overworked with work in the kitchen, with washing, with the pigs, poultry and stock, was scarce to her children. But the new life must free her and is freeing her from this unbearable labor. The kolchoz, collective labor, opens to the woman as well as the man, an absolutely new life.

All this is not a dream. It is being realized by the city workers and, with their example, the peasantry must realize it too. We must not forget that here the power is in the hands of the workers and peasants and that it serves only the interests of those who work—it has no other interests. The government and the Party are fresh of the flesh and bone of the bones of workers and peasants. In all, other countries the government serves the interests of the minority alone—the interest of factory owners, merchants, landowners. The laws which in Europe are made by parliaments, are in defense of the rich and always against the workers and peasants; they are made from the top down.

With us the laws come from below, from the village soviet, the kolchoz, the factories and plants. Take any law and we see at it here the practical experience of workers and peasants; this means that in the Soviet Union the working people themselves make the laws. When the kulak (rich peasant) whispers in the ear of the kolchoz members all kinds of lies about the Communists, let the latter not forget that, recognizing the strength and advantage of collective labor, he is already on the path toward communism, and he must understand that the kulak wants to turn him back—to be his hireling. It is natural that the kulak should do this, when the workers, and peasants government wants to see the working people the united landlord of their country and all its wealth.

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FROM THE MILLS, MINES AND THE FARMS

ALA. BASTLES USE 'PERSUADER' ON PRISONERS

New Orleans, La.

Dear Comrades:

I just returned from a start I made to the Unemployed Conference held in Washington on February 16. I was thrown into jail for three months. I want to tell you about the rotten conditions that prevail in the Alabama prisons.

There are about 25,000 prisoners in that state. If they are not totally disabled they must perform hard labor from daylight to dark, which is fourteen hours a day. If one goes to the doctor, he is given enough medicine to make him sicker than he was; they are not allowed to "lay up" unless they have a temperature of at least 104 degrees. I have seen men working when they were so sick they staggered like drunken men. If they failed to do their work, the warden has what he calls a "persuader"; it is a strap that weighs nine pounds. All of the prisoners have a mortal terror of the strap; they administer it "licks" at one time, and the victim usually goes to the hospital after he has been beaten.

Editing freight trains, or being out of a job, are common "crimes" that will get one 60 and 90 days in Alabama. And then they have guts enough to talk about convict labor in the U.S.S.R.

Comrades, we must organize against this slavery, if we don't want to die with chains on our feet.

Afraid that the German workers suffering under the combined onslaught of the Versailles Treaty, the Wall Street Young Plan and the world crisis, will overthrow this slavery, the boss-statemens are working overtime to find a means of strengthening the capitalist government of Germany and break down the powerful resistance of the German working class. Hoover's scheme is directed against the German and American workers, it seeks to not only save its investments of billions in Germany, but clear the way for further investments of millions of dollars gleaned in profits out of the sweat and starvation of the workers in this country. The money that will be invested in Germany will go towards the shooting down of the German revolutionary workers. Hoover's plan is a plan for CIVIL WAR ON THE GERMAN MASSES IMPERIALIST WAR ON THE SOVIET UNION.

Because it sold out the miners to the bosses, broke the miner's solidarity, the bosses could do as they pleased.

The National Miners Union, by its militant and faithful leadership in the present strike, has shown the miners throughout the country, that it will never sell out, that it is the only miners union which can lead the miners to victory. Under its leadership, the struggles of the miners against starvation now taking place throughout the country can and will be organized jointly, under a common program and joint demands.

This is the purpose of the Pittsburgh Conference. Miners in the Southern fields, send your delegates to Pittsburgh! Harlan miners, join forces with the 40,000 striking miners to the north of you, and continue and spread your militant struggle! Miners of the Southern fields be sure to have delegates at Pittsburgh!

Danville Workers To Fight Again Under NTWU Lead

350 workers were added to the already mounting army of the unemployed recently when the Riverside Mills No. 1, closed down indefinitely. There are now close to 5,000 unemployed workers in Danville. In spite of this being the so-called busy season unemployment is constantly on the increase.

Two years ago, according to the Chamber of Commerce figures there were more than 7,000 textile workers here in the Danville mills. However, today, instead of the 7,000 workers normally employed, we find only a little more than 2,000 mill workers, according to the best estimates. And the majority of these are on part time with greatly reduced wages.

Before the present system of inhuman speed-up and stretchout was put into force the limit for the workers in the weaving department was the running of 16 Draper looms of 28 inch width. Now they run 22 Draper looms of 34 inch width. The speed-up in the other departments has been equally great, and in some instances much worse. This new system of speed-up was initiated by the efficiency experts which the company began employing about two years ago. After each new stretchout, there inevitably followed a wage-cut. The more work turned out the less the workers received in wages.

The Enemy Comes

Naturally the workers were very much dissatisfied with their already miserable conditions getting worse. They were ready to follow any one or anything that promised relief. The Gorman gang and their UTW outfit, ever ready to prey upon the discontent of the workers, were soon on the job. With rosy promises and poisonous lies of their past achievements they began to sign up workers by the hundreds.

From the time the strike started until its final sell-out, the UTW under Gorman leadership, cooperated with the mill company to defeat the strikers. To begin with the Dan River Mills had \$100,000 dollars of goods in the Ellsachery. This would have been ruined. Gorman told the workers to go back and save this cloth for the mill company. Instead of holding this over the heads of the Company to force the demands of the union, he virtually gave the company \$100,000.00 with which to fight the strikers. Again, every time the strike

ers showed real workingclass militancy at the picket line, Gorman would call a mass meeting and tell the workers not to be so rash. "Don't use force" Gorman would say. "Use peaceful persuasion to keep the strike out." Also, he told the workers that there shouldn't be more than six pickets at a mill at a time, three days before the courts of Danville issued an injunction forbidding more than six to picket the mills!

It can thus be seen that the UTW policy from the beginning of the strike to its final disgraceful sell-out, was one of boss-class collaboration and anti-working class. The final big story about having an agreement with the company, effected through the cooperation of Mr. Flippin a university professor and a relative of the president of the Dan River Mills, and the coal Baron, Mr. Morgan, was Gorman's last grand gesture to further fool the workers, and if possible bore a few of them blinded and paying dues to his fake organization.

A Lesson Well Learned

The Danville strikers were as militant a bunch of workers as ever were on the picket line. Against the police, the professional strike-breaking National Guardsmen and the persistent advice of the UTW officials, these strikers battled militantly and successfully, for weeks kept strike out of the mills. And today the majority of these strikers realize they lost the strike thru the treachery of the UTW leaders. They still believe in a Union. But they have learned their lesson well. They want no more of the fake AF of L. They now know the difference between the bosses sell-out machine and a real red-blooded labor union such as the National Textile Workers Union. These workers prove they have learned by the fact that they are now joining the NTWU. They are preparing for the next big battle, for they know it is coming.

While the few who are working are driven to the endurance limit on the jobs, while they are having their wages cut, the army of the unemployed is constantly swelling. Mass starvation, ghost like, stares these workers in the face. Winter is approaching with its added expense, its added suffering and misery. The workers can see nothing in store for them. There is no way out except thru their mass action. They tried once and failed. But that did not discourage them. They will try again. This time it will be under the militant leadership of the NTWU.

Gunfire Behind Reprations

(A conversation on a gondola car, between a white and a colored worker, both vainly searching for work.)

WHITE WORKER: See by this here scrap of newspaper that Mellon is over in Europe trying to get the Frenchies to lay off the Huns and stop the debts for a year. Hoover sure does worry about feeding everybody but those who are starving in this here country. The ways of these politicians are queer, it strikes me. They had me fighting the Huns first to save the world for democracy, and when I got back, there may have been democracy, but I had no job. Seems like the more democracy there is, the less jobs there is. It's this guy Hoover who squawked about a treasury deficit when the veterans bonus bill was up, and Mellon squawked with him. After they cheated us out of half our bonus, they're going to stop the war debts. It's queer, tho.

NEGRO WORKER: I ain't seen nothing of the war debts Hoover's been collecting up to now, either. Looks like Hoover and Mellon and Wall Street are just putting their feet down on Europe. Mellon ain't no pure white, no ear. Looks like to me, he's over there with sinister purposes. I ain't never yet heard sweet words from a white boss man, that ain't meant something else. When they're putting sweeties on your brain, it means they're jes getting ready to do something with you that you ain't going to like. When diplomats go sailing over the water, there's something stirring. I been in the last war, too, and when I lost my arm, I got something pumped into my head. And that something is stinking and growing all the time. And that something says: 'Watch out, you're going to be inhaling poison gases pretty soon, and a load of bird shot's going to be nothing to what you're going to get.' Which sort of makes me think they're some gunfire behind this here reprations business. Another rich man's war and a poor man's fight.

WHITE WORKER: You got sense. Looks like Hoover is feared of a revolution in Germany and that's why he wants to help the Hun government. You know, those German workers are starving just like we is, 'cept that they is fighting about 1000 times better.

NEGRO WORKER: Ain't that the truth! And let me tell you something else, white man. Been notice' all this talk about Russia? How they want to put a blockade on her? Seems somehow, its concerted up, Russia and reprations and starving. Looks like they's rather kill us off in a war that feed us. Looks to me like they don't want no Red Russia. Yes, ear, white man, looks like they want to shoot us to Moscow to overthrow the reds and Mellon is over there making the arrangements for the march. Looks that-away and I don't like it.

WHITE WORKER: Neither do I. Seems like those Russians are getting along alright, seems like they're not starving, that everybody's working. Looks like they did the right thing in that there revolution of theirs and I hope it comes in Germany and here, too, yes, right here. I got a wife and children starving in the mine camps, and here I am riding all over God's country searching for work. This here system is crazy, and I got something else to fight for before I fight for it. There's another kind of march I'm going on before that March on Moscow. If there's going to be a war, it's going to be right here.

NEGRO WORKER: And me, too. You just took them far words out of my mouth.
